Assignment:

Please read Ayn Rand's essay "The 'Conflicts' of Men's Interests" (from *The Virtue of Selfishness*). Pick <u>one</u> question to write on and submit your essay by the above deadline. Conference faculty will review your answers, and during a conference session may comment on any questions or issues raised. Please keep your answer to no more than 400 words.

- 1. Why do you think Rand thought there was a need to write an article on this topic? What is she trying to convey about her distinctive approach to ethics?
- 2. What are some apparent conflicts of interest that seem vexing to you that are not addressed by the essay?
- 3. What are some philosophies or popular viewpoints that presuppose there are conflicts of interest among rational men, and how would Rand's essay address them?

General Questions about Objectivism:

In addition to the above questions about the readings, please submit a question about issues in Objectivism (or about philosophy more generally) that confuse you, or which you'd simply like to understand better. Please describe what originally sparked this question for you, and add something about what value you hope to gain from answering the question. Conference faculty will review your questions and select some of them to answer in a conference session.
